Christ King Chicks

This year, as part of our Agricultural Science Special Topic Module, we were given the opportunity to take care of chicks. This came as quite a surprise to students, after we had learned about the anatomy of the hen in previous classes. It was a great learning curve for the entire school, as students got to learn about a topic which is not commonly found in the urban areas surrounding our school.

In the days approaching our Easter holidays, Ms O'Donoghue arrived at school with an incubator filled with several fertilised eggs. Due to my sheer love of Agricultural Science, I arrived at the Physics Lab before she had the chance to finish setting up!! The excitement got the better of me and I let out a squeal, however I soon learned that being loud around the chick eggs was not a good idea. I chose an egg carefully to place into the incubator, and I spread the wonderful news around the entire building!

In previous Ag. Science classes, we had discussed the anatomy and care of hens and poultry, which we found rather interesting, and I felt that this would be extremely beneficial in looking after the chicks once they had hatched. We had also learned about egg production and the battery and cage-free production systems. The food and nutrition aspects of this learning proved to be rather helpful in the coming weeks.

The incubation period of the eggs is 21 days, so once we had returned from our Easter break, movement began inside, on the hatching trays. On Friday, the 29th of April, the first chick hatched. We gave it the beautiful name of 'Chickira'. This name stuck, as classes upon classes arrived to see the ever-increasing number of yellow, and black fluffy chicks. The Ag. Science students helped to care for the chicks, ensuring they had enough feed and that they were all kept warm under the infrared lamp in their comfortable living quarters.

Choosing Chemistry

Chemistry has always been an aspect of science I have had an interest in, from the interesting concepts to the dedicated teachers, I have always had an interest in learning more. In the junior cycle I learnt about all three sciences but chemistry piqued my interest. I got a taste of chemistry as a stand-alone subject in TY for a short period of time and knew I wanted to select it as one of my senior cycle subjects. This year I got to experience a full year of chemistry and although the calculations can be challenging, my favourite part has to be taking part in experiments and seeing the real life applications of chemistry in today's world. The subject is tricky at times but with hard work, patience and perseverance chemistry has allowed me to gain a deeper understanding of the world around me. Kefir4All – Citizen Scientist Research Project with Teagasc

Kefir4All is a citizen scientist research project run by PhD students based in Teagasc, Moorepark. A citizen scientist is a member of the public who participates in collecting and analysing data from a scientific project. Christ King put forward a group of ten highly committed students to carry out active research as part of the project for five months. The aim of the project was to investigate the growth of different microorganisms and evolutionary changes within the water kefir grains throughout a fermentation period. Each student fermented their kefir grains in many different environments. This was a massive undertaking for all involved, as fermentations had to be changed every 2-3 days for the entirety of the five month project. Samples were collected monthly and are currently undergoing laboratory analysis.

Throughout the project, a leader board was created and shared amongst all schools and citizen scientists taking part. Christ King topped the leaderboard frequently throughout the duration of the project, leading to each Christ King student becoming an 'expert fermenter'. This accomplishment highlighted the dedication and hard work that each student put into their own part of the research.

Students involved had the amazing opportunity of visiting Teagasc's research facilities down in Moorepark, Fermoy. Here, students had the chance to see areas of research that are currently under development, such as 3D printing, robotics, flavour and aroma chemistry and DNA sequencing. This trip was organised as a thank you from Teagasc for the commitment that our students gave to the project. Not only do all students come away from



this project with their contributions being published in a PhD research paper, they also come away with valuable knowledge that they can take with them as they continue to enhance their learning of Science and Technology.

Model Council of the European Union Debate

As part of the European Studies TY programme, on Thursday, 3 March, 2022, Sara Griffin and I participated in the *Model Council* of the European Union Debate representing the position of Germany. Davis College Model United Nations (MUN) Conference



From Tuesday, 3 to Thursday, 5 May, 2022, ten Transition Year students joined by two Fifth Year students participated in the annual Model United Nations (MUN) Conference in Cork City Hall. The conference is organised by Davis College, Mallow.

The ten of us who participated from TY were Aoife O'Sullivan, Bahiya Al Steif, Claire Herbert, Emily Nolan, Keira Fitzpatrick, Marlene Liebendoerfer, Sara Griffin, Sarah Allen, Sophie Jones and Vennelaa Chellapuri and we were joined by fifth year students, Ayushi Mahajan and Kate Ahern.

We joined approximately 400 students from 30 schools in Ireland along with students from a school in Valladolid, Spain. We assumed the role of delegates and represented different counties and non-governmental organisations as we debated resolutions in the General Assembly, Special Conference, and Security Assembly on topics of pressing national and global importance.

We discussed and debated social, political, and economic issues that are facing Ireland and the wider world today. Topics included the Russian invasion of Ukraine, disinformation, hate speech and homophobia, domestic violence, pandemics and other pressing global issues.

Lobbying amongst student delegates commences on the first day. Students that have never met before from 30 different schools start writing resolutions. We then merged the resolutions and submitted them to the approval panel. The approval panel then decided the best resolutions which created great excitement. The resolutions that were selected were then debated over the next few days. The students then must speak from the perspective of the

STEM Passport for Inclusion Initiative

Last year 25 of our Transition Year students embarked on a new initiative, the *STEM Passport for Inclusion Programme*. Microsoft Ireland and Maynooth University joined forces in a first-of-its-kind collaboration to address digital inequality in education and increase the number of girls engaging in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Maths (STEM) subjects. The collaboration was designed to further strengthen Ireland's future talent pipeline and reinforce the country's digital leadership. The Lab Days were hosted by young professional women with careers in STEM. Not only were students provided with training in Computer Science related areas, they were also given valuable information and advice on STEM related careers.

Many students who never thought of a career in Computer Science or other STEM related fields are now giving serious consideration to such third level courses and careers. Other students who previously thought they would love a career in Computer Science have discovered that such a field of study may not be for them!

In addition to the three lab days, Students also had to undertake independent learning assignments. One of our students, Peri-Elkie Tiendioh's independent learning projects, exceeded all expectations that the programme facilitators asked Peri to undertake a special recorded interview with them.

On Friday, 13 May, 2022, our TY students received a special *micro-award in 21st century STEM Skills* presented by Professor Maggie Cusack, MTU President. The award is valued at 50 additional CAO points which students may use to access selected STEM courses in Maynooth University and Munster Technological University. The number of universities accepting these points may increase.

This is the first award of its kind in Ireland and it is believed it will pave the way for future generations of Women in STEM! During the last academic year, places were limited to 25 students from Christ King and many TY students were disappointed not to have acquired a place. Next year the programme will be available to all TY students in our school.

The students who participated in the programme really enjoyed and benefited from the experience. For many students, the *STEM Passport for Inclusion Programme* was the highlight of their year!

Finally, we would like to sincerely thank personnel from Microsoft Ireland, Maynooth University, Munster Technological University and the RDI Hub Killorglin for providing our TY students with a most beneficial, interesting, professional and enjoyable experience.

Ash Wednesday



For Catholic Schools Week, first year students researched a person who created a positive change in the world.








Why YOU should join Politics

To all the people reading this article, who know me and also who don't know me, I have this very immense passion for politics. A passion of not a majority of people especially young people, from what I can tell. Well, this was me before I came to Ireland.

But all that changed when I arrived in Christ King Secondary School and was introduced to a youth organisation called 'Comhairle na nOg' (Voice for the young). Comhairle provides young people from the ages of twelve to eighteen, a platform for airing their views on a wide range of issues affecting them, both on a local and national level. Some people also like to call it "baby politics". Soon after joining, I was elected to the National Executive of Comhairle where I now represent the interests of the Cork city branch.

Previously I used to absolutely hate politics and literally every single thing about it! Yes! That was me! Mainly because I come from India and if you have ever watched an Indian news channel, you know what I am talking about. There's a whole game of thrones going in Indian politics and with my immensely patriotic heart, I actually mean it.

Being a part of the National Executive team, I was offered the opportunity to take part in a panel discussion on the following topic: "How can governments and parliamentarians all over Europe ensure child participation during times of crisis such as war displacement, climate change, pandemics and migration?". Considering that young people are the most vulnerable victims in every crisis and the fact that we have no say in matters that affect our future is most concerning.

It was not a local event, not even a national one, but a European event! It was the Council of Europe Conference and Ireland being a part of it, held the presidency this year. The panel discussion was to be an integral part of the Conference which was being held in Cork from 23-25 May, 2022. The conference was in partnership with 5 other countries as well – Czech Republic, Slovenia, Iceland, Portugal and Finland.

So, as you can probably make out, this was definitely quite a big deal! My whole body was shivering and sweating as I walked into the very fancy hall - Aula Maxima in UCC which was full of adults and only ADULTS! My mom certainly did not help matters by whispering in my ear, "Oh dear, I think you're the youngest person in the room." Hell yeah, she was right!

The thought of being the youngest person in the room was eating me alive. However, I reminded myself of my purpose as I began to interact with reporters, researchers and youth workers from the 5 participating countries. Surprisingly, this aspect of the conference was a breeze! But, all too soon, it was time for the panel discussion.

My name was called out first and I was the first panellist to introduce myself on stage. (Haha, lucky me!) I expressed my deep passion for politics and the democratic system, while also sharing my experience of migrating to Ireland during the pandemic which was extremely challenging. I ended my address on a serious note: "You may not care about politics, but politics cares about you." After which the audience went into a roar of laughter and applause which really helped me to stop shaking.

The introductions were followed by many intriguing discussions on a variety of questions: Why are young people the biggest victims in a crisis? How can this be solved? Will reducing the voting age solve this problem? How can schools ensure child participation? How can adults motivate and help in the process of ensuring and promoting it? Why is child participation necessary? Followed by conclusions from all the panellists.

Much credit is due to Professor Ursula Kilkelly for moderating the three-hour long panel discussion but her task was made all the easier by the amazing panel and wonderful audience gathered that day in UCC.

It is fashionable today to describe Politics as a swamp. For many it has become nothing more than a vulgar spectacle of deceit, ambition and opportunism. Today, the fact is that it is increasing at a concerning rate amongst the youth, the future. This is what makes it concerning. What do we see happening in the digital world? Social media drives politics. But why? Isn't politics something that is done through direct and traditional ways of participation?

Well, it has taken a different turn in the 21st century... Teenagers have been using social media and ONLY social media to express themselves and issues that affect them and the world. At the end of the day, it might become the most trending hashtag on Twitter but quite sadly and inevitably, doesn't solve the issue and never will.

Today, the issue we are tackling is the lack of trust young people have in politicians and the political process. It is increasing at an alarming rate and this is why we must take action now. I can understand this because this was me earlier but my ideology changed when I started seeing that the dynamism of young people can completely turn things around. There are innumerable examples of this all over the world. Look at Malala Yousafzai and Greta Thunberg. 
