Reflections on my time in Christ King

Louise Velon has a talent for capturing the flavour and essence of the moment and the six years she spent at Christ King Secondary School. As she leaves school, she wrote the following contemplative reflection.

I'm on a walk the evening the Leaving cert is cancelled and by some timely stroke of serendipity I bump into my playschool teacher for the first time in over twelve years. In the manner of all adults you haven't seen for a significant period, she can't quite believe the age of me.

"Leaving Cert already?" she exclaims "God, crazy how time flies"

She isn't wrong. I can't believe any more than she can that no booklist will come through the door this Summer or that the worn souls of my Dubarrys won't once again be peddling me down blue corridors this September. And whilst these all feel like normal, run-of-the-mill incredulities, that I imagine all graduating classes are confronted with, there is an added sense of disbelief given that our schooling had ended with the abruptness of a live government briefing in early March.

As most endings do, and especially extremely abrupt ones that are followed by copious amounts of free time otherwise known as quarantine, they have the effect of forcing reflection.

How long is six years? I find myself asking.

Six years is the duration of World War II. Six years is the length of time it took J.K Rowling to write the first book in the Harry Potter series. And far from any fantastical worlds and even further from the trenches of deadly conflicts, six years is of course the portion of our lives that most of us spent in Christ King.

From the above examples it is clear that six years has the potential to feel both extraordinarily long and fleetingly short. I think that I speak for everyone when I say that our Christ King journey cosily fits the latter.

And whilst our time in school felt like it passed in the blink of an eye, six years has the potential to be many things and take many forms. It can take six years to mature from preteen to young adult. It can take six years to realise you still don't understand fractions. It can take six years to realise that your teachers really aren't out to get you. It can take six years for you to admit that non-uniform days are stressful, and you actually love your uniform despite spending the entirety of that time whining about it. It can take six years to make friends, lose friends change friends and make more friends. It can take six years to realise that you're probably not going to live out your high school musical dreams in the way Troy Bolton conditioned you into thinking you would. It can take six years to master Christ King's many stairways while simultaneously accepting that no amount of stairs will trick you into thinking you're really in Hogwarts or give you a valid excuse for being late to class. It can take six years to wrap your head around the fact that such a big place can exist and also be the least noticeable building from the South Douglas Road. It can take six years to realise that you miss the place you sometimes (just sometimes) couldn't wait to move on from.

But we all get there in the end, albeit this year the realisations may have hit us alone in our rooms or at best while facetiming a friend. Nonetheless our psyches are all similarly marked by the shared realisations, frustrations and joys of being a Christ King girl. It's like a unique stamp, an invisible tattoo, a permanent intersection of our lives that will remain no matter how much they disperse in the coming years. The building off Half Moon Lane, or the one behind the flower house as it is more commonly known, will always be the familiar focal point of our teenage years – the epicentre of their dramas whose shockwaves sometimes left us feeling like we



wouldn't get past the earthquakes of our own lives as well as the source of their lightest most carefree moments which continue to prosper in the friends we made there.

Nostalgia aside, I for one look back with great fondness and gratitude at my time in Christ King. Gratitude that it recognised the potential of those six years. Gratitude that it recognised the potential of the pool of twelve-year-old girls that arrived in its doors in September of 2014, swimming in oversized blue uniforms that their Mothers said they would grow into. And while my tracksuit is still baggy around the waist, I've certainly grown into my own while at Christ King.

Nothing has validated this more than the last few weeks and months, when the school spirit felt much like the Wi-Fi connection – invisible but greatly appreciated. We were already in some ways living in Christ King's legacy – one of friendship community and support. It sustained us then and will continue to do so as time continues to fly and propels us into the next six years of our lives.

Whether we left early, joined late, skipped a year, repeated a year or were present for the full six, the blue corridors of Christ King are the shared terrain of each of our individual memories. The assemblies, masses, exams, classes, sport teams, choirs, clubs, friend groups, trips, trade fairs, fundraisers and competitions we were a part of may morph with our growing perceptions into the tiniest of blue pin drops in the oceans of our lives but much like Nano's ever-burning flame, the ripples will be perpetually felt.

Neat Streets





A number of TY students were involved in a Neat Streets initiative at the beginning of the year. Neat Streets is Ireland's #1 Anti-Litter and Waste Programme Secondary Schools. for The programme is divided up into a number of primary stages over the academic year from registration to awards to help participants

Each school will develop a Neat Streets model that best suits its own circumstances, as schools will identify different priorities and set specific targets following initial investigations. An Taisce provides ongoing support, training, & equipment. Neat Streets works with schools tackling litter and waste. Most schools are working toward their first Green-Schools green flag for litter and waste. On record, 90% of all participating schools go on to achieve the green flag. It is a work in progress for us at Christ King.



Last September, we decided to enter a project into the BT Young Scientist Exhibition, Niamh and Caoimhe with a group project and Jana with an individual project. We got in contact with Ms Quilter who helped us with our project and gave us advice for the proposal. Our projects were entitled

"A statistical analysis of young people's opinions on climate change and how this compares to older generations" - Caoimhe Byrne and Niamh Hayes and

"Investigating the factors that influence career choice for men and women" -Jana Alkarjeh.

At the end of October, we found out that both our projects had gotten through.

We spent the next few months working on our projects, putting together the project book and poster. We put together surveys and sent them out to as many people as we could. On the morning of the 8th January we went up to Dublin to the RDS where the exhibition was taking place. We had judges looking at our projects and discussing them with us over the course of the exhibition and we were asked questions about our project by visitors as well. The closing ceremony took place on Friday evening where all the winners were announced. We had so much fun at the exhibition and it was a really great experience. We got to meet people from all around the country and a few of our friends came up to visit us on Friday as well.

My Experience at the BT Young Scientist Exhibition - By Jana Alkarajeh

Taking part in the BT Young Scientist Exhibition was one of the most memorable experiences I have had in secondary school so far. The BT Young Scientist is a huge national event sponsored by BT Ireland and more than fifty other companies and institutions, providing 12 to 19-year-old students with an opportunity to present individual or group projects in the areas of Social and Behavioural Sciences, Chemical, Physical and Mathematical Sciences, Biological and Ecological Sciences, and Technology. It also has various stalls, activities, and exhibits from the sponsors of the competition.

In the process of preparing for the BT Young Scientist, I was very lucky to be able to attend afterschool sessions with a company called Teen-Turn every week which provided mentors, support, and feedback for my project. My project was entitled 'Investigating the factors influencing the career choices of men and women' where I carried out a survey with Senior Cycle students asking them about their educational experiences and career aspirations. I surveyed them about what subject options are offered in their schools, the type of school they went to (i.e., boys, girls or mixed), their hobbies, the subject choices they made, their possible career paths, etc. I took the approach of categorising the answers of the career aspirations, hobbies and subject choices questions using Holland's Personality Profiler which categorised career areas under Artistic. Realistic. Administrative, Investigative, Linguistic and Social. I gathered the frequency of answers under each category and compared the frequencies of male and female responses in order to compare and analyse the data.

One of the key findings was that more boys than girls schools offered realistic subjects (eg. Woodwork, Construction, Agricultural Science, Technology and DCG), more boys than girls subsequently chose Leaving Cert subjects under

the realistic category and therefore listed a realistic career as their primary career aspiration. Similarly, more girls than boys schools offered creative subjects (such as Home Economics, Art, and Music), more female than male respondents chose a creative subject for Leaving Cert and put a creative career as their primary career aspiration. These findings showed that inequality of opportunity to pick the same types of subjects in boys and girls schools is a potential factor in the gender gap seen in careers that are male or female-dominated. I also researched the current scientific studies and findings on biological differences in interests between males and females and found conflicting views among scientists. The main common ground, however, is that there are more similarities than differences between males and females on average, most differences in the interests and traits occurs at the extremes of the spectrum.

Overall, carrying out this project has broadened my perspective on the areas of social and behavioural sciences such as psychology and neurology and taught me concepts that I have not come across before such as personality psychology, career development aspects and other scientific terminology and approaches. The experience of presenting at the BT Young Scientist Exhibition was very nerve-wracking at the start and especially before the first round of judging, which happened only a few hours after we arrived in Dublin. However, despite this, the judging went very smoothly. The judges were professionals and experts in many areas such as CEO's of organisations to doctors of psychology and other scientists. The three judges that I presented to throughout the exhibition time were very attentive, conversational and constructive. The professionalism yet the enthusiasm and inspiration that I saw at the exhibition was very motivating and exciting for me and enhanced my interest in science.

I was also visited by Micheal Martin and Micheal McGrath, two Fine Fáil politicians and also by an American-British novelist, playwright and TV broadcaster Bonnie Greer, who were all so inspiring and encouraging. Looking back at the BT Young Scientist Exhibition fills me with joy, inspiration and great memories. It was such a brilliant learning, growing and insightful journey that I will always remember.





2020, a year that already is one that will forever be remembered as one we wish we could forget. I vividly remember what feels like years ago, scrolling through statistics of a distant virus in China, away from me and my life. 2020 was supposed to be my year, filled with stress in the anticipation of exams, but then the best summer of my life. I can safely say this year is not the new decade filled with prosperity and luck that my horoscope promised me way back in the simple and untroubled times of 2019,this silent threat came quicker than any of us could have anticipated, sweeping the lives of everyone with it.

The prospect of a new decade, and new opportunities were taken as quickly as my freedom, the imaginary barrier of two kilometres curtailing any and all of our movements. The date of when this lockdown will end has become etched in my brain, a date I imagine we'll remember as some kind of strange anniversary in years to come. Lockdown is a harsh word in my eyes, as if everyone has been incarcerated unknowingly, although the making of jigsaws and compulsive baking reassure me that we are the opposite of hardened criminals. I remember the 28th of February, when this all began, a normal Thursday evening, in the car on the way to training, my sister as usual, blaring her personal and sometimes questionable music choices, as my dad fired his requests for 80's music which of course, let out a unanimous groan from both of us. As we reached the carpark of my GAA club my mum rang from the hospital, again nothing unusual, as a nurse she was on call, so we expected to hear from her, as she had been on cases since early that morning. She whispered into the phone, "There's a case here". We let out a gasp, unsure of what this meant, for us as a family, but also as a country, what did this mean for school?, for life ?. That training session was a strange one, I remember suddenly becoming aware of everyone, how close they were, how close I was to them, things I never would have given a second thought to, but in that moment everything changed, the situation had rapidly turned from anticipation to preparation, but I still didn't really know what for. From that point, rumours flew around from person to person 'they're shutting the schools', 'the city will be on lockdown', there'll be no orals, maybe not even a leaving cert', ' this is the start of it now', all outrageously abstract theories, ones we never thought would come true at the time.

It is interesting to look back to February when the biggest concern in this country was the election, normal things that we never guessed would be in jeopardy. Harsh slanders in debates by the opposing politicians or Sinn Féin's unexpected landslide victory was the only headline news, accompanied by the feeling that politics was a game, the bid for Taoiseach seeming to be a congeniality contest. In these last few weeks and months, however, politics has not been about opposing parties, policies or jabs at an opponent's remarks, politics has become moderate again, the political party you belong to being indifferent. Parties do not matter here, there is no political agenda when it comes to this virus. Although a government still needs to be formed, I believe it shows the rarity of the times we are in , that the usually opposed parties of Fianna Fáil and Fine Gael have agreed to enter into a coalition, a far cry from the turbulent political landscape of our past. Ireland is united in all aspects which is more than can be said for other countries. As a normally friendly and outgoing population, isolation and quarantine is unlike us, staying away from the people we love seeming unimaginable. Our usual happenings of nights out or meeting up with friends have been taken away from us, but simultaneously, we know that this is what has to be done to protect each other. It seems confusing now, and there is still so much we are unsure of, but amidst the uncertainty, there is good, and there are positives that have come from this virus. Whether it is the transparency and honesty of our politicians, or the solidarity of neighbours and communities coming together to help the elderly or the vulnerable, it has evoked a real sense of pride in the nation and has reminded me what it means to be Irish. Leo Varadkar summed it up perfectly on St.Patrick's Day when he said "we are all in this together", this national effort never to be forgotten. My gratitude to the government and the steps they have taken, amount to so much more than a vote or a tick on a ballot card, Ireland being forever grateful for the sacrifices they have made.

In the beginning, this new normal took some getting used to, a holiday feeling coming to mind, but as I was sharply reminded, this was not the case by the ding of google classroom notifications that school was still on, even from the comfort of my pyjamas. In the beginning, I thought this would be over in a matter of weeks, but as we approach the 3 month mark, I still don't see the 'eureka' moment of normal life returning, and it seems as if that will have to wait until 2021, 2020 passing us by completely, social distancing unfortunately becoming part of our lives for the foreseeable future. For some, boredom has taken on new forms. I for one, put boredom into the hands of my mother, who unwillingly, I will admit, cut my hair. Others drank eggs and ran 5k in some questionable times, but it is nice to see that in the worst of circumstances people can come together and realise that other people need our help, that there is always someone who needs it more, while benefiting our health at the same time. Hopefully, we will continue to see the redeeming aspects of this lockdown by helping more people who need it most in these uncertain times.

I can't seem to remember life before Covid-19. Now, the most notable, yet simultaneously worst part of my days is at the same time every evening, roughly at around 5:40pm when I refresh twitter, hoping to be met with any glimmer of hope from Tony, as

I call him now, the medical officer I frankly didn't know existed until three months ago, who has now become my main news outlet, either the bearer of more bad news or the comfort I yearn for of flattening the curve that bit more. I have unusually become extremely interested in the statistics of Covid-19, my ordinary level maths taking me just far enough, to my dismay. I attentively listen to George Lee or Fergal Bowers each night, again hoping numbers will fall and the graphs show a decline. I will admit, in the early days of the virus, I was, like many others afraid to look at the news for fear of what was to be said, all the news outlets seeming so impersonal when talking about the bleak details of what is happening in this country and around the world. I found myself lost in CNN and BBC articles, the daily figures fascinating me to a point where every morning it is the first thing I look at. As the weeks progressed instead of typed, impersonal articles, I ventured towards the press conferences, waiting, hovering above the x in the top right corner, if the information became too much. Although I quickly realised there is something reassuring in the now, thankfully very regular quote of 'a slight drop' by Dr Holohan, that helps me cope with this threat facing our lives. I dread the notification each day, telling me the unfortunate reality of what is happening in Ireland, but the important thing I have realised is that it is happening, and I must take that for what it is, with no embellishment. There are days when I want to turn my phone into a frisbee and hurl it as far as the eye can see for obvious reasons, but I do take advice and comfort from Leo Varadkar's speech when he said 'fear is a virus in itself'. This is a pandemic, the type of thing that is strictly reserved for zombie and sci-fi movies, never real life, and while there are days that I can't bear to listen to the news from around the world or irrelevant or often absurd tweets of Donald Trump, here we are, and we must accept that the virus is here, and will be here for a long time and learn to move forward with the restrictions it has and continues to put on us, theoretically for the moment that is.

This time has called for a reflection on everyone's part, in me, evoking a sense of gratitude for the things I do have rather than those I do not. The most important thing I remember is that nobody knows what to do here. Not me, not politicians, not even the World Health Organisation. This has never happened before. It speaks for all of our characters that we can persevere through these times. The word 'unprecedented' although extremely overused, is the only fitting phrase to describe this pandemic. No one knows what the next few months will bring, and so, we need to give ourselves more credit for our resolve in this current situation. This pandemic has taught me that there are so many things that come before holidays or nights out, and things I would usually take for granted should be paramount in my life. These times have brought a wake-up call to learn to appreciate people and to make time for each other. It is amazing that even though we are all apart, we are closer than ever. It has taught me to be thankful for those I can count on. A few nights ago, my mum said, 'I can't believe it has come to a point where I am excited to join a queue in a shop', but shouldn't that be what life is about? Enjoying life for the simple things? Thinking back, we were all moving too fast for our own good, becoming caught up in the unimportant aspects of our lives and forgetting to appreciate what we have, instead of chasing things that serve no purpose in the grand scheme of things. Perhaps we should not forget this year, but embrace what we have learned about ourselves and how we live our lives.

This virus has robbed us of our daily routines, our lives and time being put on hold, but no one is at fault, there is no one to blame,

This news is unbearable, knowing that people have lost their lives to this inhuman virus, but now, we must do everything we can to honour them. Simon Harris said that years from now, will they say Ireland did all it could to stop this virus, and if someone asked you where you were and what you did during this time, would you be proud to say you gave it everything?" I hope so.

Although this is not over by any means and even though covid-19 will continue to exist in our lives, I will continue to look towards the future, that there are better brighter days ahead unshrouded by the coronavirus, and that we can continue to show our efforts and prove their effectiveness in the fight as a country against this cruel virus, and to accept that there is light at the end of the tunnel, no matter how long or dark it may seem.




